Manager's Message

Dear Members:

Your data is safe with Plumas-Sierra! Recently, S.J.34, a joint resolution from Congress, was signed into law allowing telecommunications companies to sell your internet browsing data.

That will not happen here because PSREC is a member-owned cooperative. It is etched in stone that our members' electric use and even their identities are protected. This policy covers all of our telecommunications services for members and nonmembers. Please let us know if you would like more information on our privacy policies.

PST/PSREC Anniversaries

2017 marks the 80th anniversary of the founding of Plumas-Sierra Rural Electric Cooperative and the 30th of our subsidiary Plumas-Sierra Telecommunications. Both entities were founded for the same purpose—to improve the quality of life of our member-owners and our region.

In the next few issues, we will look back at the history of both entities, and review where the cooperative and its subsidiary are going in the future.

Our electric utility performed well in the strong storms of early 2017, even though we know it was not flawless. Owning our own utility has allowed us to put the time, energy and money into keeping your lights on.

Additionally, we are able to make our own decisions about where and how to buy power. All across California, communities are setting up community choice aggregations, which allow communities—usually counties—to make their own power purchasing decisions, while leaving investor owned utilities (such as PG&E) to run the poles and wires. These CCAs are an attempt to model cooperative and

municipal types of utilities, but key parts of the business—including service and reliability—are still left to decision makers far removed from the regions they serve.

Plumas-Sierra REC already handles both sides of the business—power supply and local control of our grid. Because we have local control, we were able to groom our rights-of-way, change out our poles and build the backup power line to Nevada. This saved us weeks of power outages across the last 25 years.

Our goal is not to suck money out of our region and give it to investors. Our goal is to build a reliable and cost-effective system and keep money in your pocket. That's the cooperative model.

Our telecommunications subsidiary is owned by the cooperative and generally operates on cooperative principles. Profits are put back into expanding and improving service to the region. Supporting Plumas-Sierra Telecommunications by buying its services ensures the money stays local to build better networks, which will improve service to our schools, hospitals and homes, and improve cellphone service.

Director Elections

In the cooperative world, we have a truism that goes, "Good cooperatives have great boards."

This year, Districts 6 and 7 are up for election. District 6 (North Doyle, Milford and Herlong areas) is served by Tom Hammond, and District 7 (Edgemont and Levitt areas) is served by Nancy Miller. The boundaries of each district are on the PSREC website.
